

The Church Revival Team met August16th and had another productive meeting. Final arrangements were made for the Friendship Sunday on August 22, which turned into a huge success.


The Team has agreed to pursue a Youth Director. In addition, an effort will be made to attract a praise band.

The Practices of Maturity

¹² In fact, though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you the elementary truths of God's word all over again. You need milk, not solid food! ¹³ Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. ¹⁴ But solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil.

Hebrews 5:12-14

Believers are on a continual growth track that ascends higher and higher. This side of heaven none of us ever "arrive," but we each have a responsibility to press on to maturity. Though many people think those who know a lot about the Bible are the spiritually mature ones, Hebrews 5:14 adds the element of *practice* to the growth equation. This word means a custom or habit. Christian growth requires the discipline of godly habits carried out daily.

The most important practice to cultivate is a personal devotional time. Since God is the source of all spiritual development, you can't neglect Him and expect to become mature. Transformation begins with time in His Word and prayer.

Obedience is another essential element for advancement. When our desire to obey the Lord is stronger than our attraction to sin, we'll know we are making progress in our spiritual life.

In terms of physical development, the goal is to become more independent and self-sufficient as we age. But in the spiritual realm, the opposite is true. Those who are mature in Christ recognize their own inadequacy and rely on the Holy Spirit within them. It's His job to transform our character and empower us to accomplish everything the Lord calls us to do.

Getting older doesn't mean maturity in God's eyes. By digging into Scripture and developing righteous habits, we can use our years to grow stronger in the Lord instead of wasting time with passivity. No one accidentally becomes mature. Spiritual growth requires a diligent pursuit of God.



<u>Dynamic Congregational Lay</u> <u>Leadership</u>

Some years ago, while serving on the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, I participated in the annual interview of candidates who were seeking approval for ordination as an elder. My attention was arrested by a bold statement of one candidate. He let the interview committee know that his goal was to become the pastor of a great church, implying that he was going to be a great pastor.

My mind replayed that interview recently while reading *The Soul of America: The Battle for Our Better Angels* by the presidential historian, Jon Meacham. The book explores periods of US history and presidential politics that grappled with the policies of fear and the policies of hope. The author assesses the leadership of several presidents and notes how they were able to provide the presidential leadership that was needed at a particular time in the nation's history, such as the Great Depression, the Civil Rights Era and so on.


Meacham shares a quote about leadership from Eleanor Roosevelt: *Great leaders we have had, but we could not have had great leaders unless they had a great people to follow. You cannot be a great leader unless the people are great.* In terms of the United Methodist Church, this statement is a tribute to the laity who make a congregation great.

The early Methodist movement in America was made up of small congregations. These local congregations were dependent upon class leaders who were lay people. There were numerous examples of the class leader serving as a lay pastor, often pinch hitting in the absence of the circuit rider pastor. The class leaders could be found making house calls among the sick, and other laity who needed a visit.

There are certain characteristics of great people who make a congregation great:

- *1.* They are on the spiritual path with other spiritual leaders, and they are growing in Christ.
- 2. These gifted persons are willing to employ their gifts in the work of ministry. They are enabled to discover their own gift (one or many) and use it for the benefit of the congregation's ministry.
- 3. They are willing to hold up the corners of the church with their prayer, presence, gifts, service and witness.
- 4.Such leaders actively engage in the ministry of their local church as partners.
- 5. These leaders have a solid relationship with God, the Church, and God's people.

Because ministry is relational, when faithful lay people connect together in mutual partnerships, God enables them to do the work of ministry. This kind of partnering is the lifeblood of a great congregation. Effective pastors help to nurture lay people who become great leaders. These leaders in turn foster the growth of a great congregation. It is a privilege for ministers to pastor a great congregation, one that is above the norm, because great congregations nurture great pastors. In the spirit of Pentecost may the Holy Spirit shape your local church into a great congregation.

Our Book Group is always looking for more readers who like to chat with friends about books. We meet the **second Wednesday** of the month at **1:00pm** in the new! Memorial / Prayer Room (after September)

Wednesday, September 8: *The Bell Jar* by Sylvia Plath. September is our Read a Classis Month. The Bell Jar chronicles the crack-up of Esther Greenwood: brilliant, beautiful, enormously talented, and successful, but slowly going under—maybe for the last time. Sylvia Plath masterfully draws the reader into Esther's breakdown with such intensity that Esther's insanity becomes completely real and even rational, as probable and accessible an experience as going to the movies. Such deep penetration into the dark and harrowing corners of the psyche is an extraordinary accomplishment and has made The Bell Jar a haunting American classic.

Wednesday, October 13: The Whisper Man by Alex North. After the sudden death of his wife, Tom Kennedy believes a fresh start will help him and his young son Jake heal. A new beginning, a new house, a new town: Featherbank. But Featherbank has a dark past. Twenty years ago, a serial killer abducted and murdered five residents. Until Frank Carter was finally caught, he was nicknamed "The Whisper Man," for he would lure his victims out by whispering at their windows at night. Just as Tom and Jake settle into their new home, a young boy vanishes. His disappearance bears an unnerving resemblance to Frank Carter's crimes, reigniting old rumors that he preyed with an accomplice. Now, detectives Amanda Beck and Pete Willis must find the boy before it is too late, even if that means Pete has to revisit his great foe in prison: The Whisper Man. And then Jake begins acting strangely. He hears a whispering at his window ...

Wednesday, November 10: What Rose Forgot by Nevada Barr. Rose Dennis wakes up in a hospital gown, her brain in a fog, only to discover that she's been committed to an Alzheimer's Unit in a nursing home. With no memory of how she ended up in this position, Rose is sure that something is very wrong. When she overhears one of the administrators saying about her that she's "not making it through the week," Rose is convinced that if she's to survive, she has to get out of the nursing home. She avoids taking her medication, putting on a show for the aides, then stages her escape. The only problem is-how does she convince anyone that she's not actually demented? Her relatives were the ones to commit her, all the legal papers were drawn up, the authorities are on the side of the nursing home, and even she isn't sure she sounds completely sane. But any lingering doubt Rose herself might have had is erased when a would-be killer shows up in her house in the middle of the night. Now Rose knows that someone is determined to get rid of her. With the help of her computer hacker/recluse sister Marion, thirteen-year old granddaughter Mel, and Mel's friend Royal, Rose begins to gather her strength and fight back-to find out who is after her and take back control of her own life. But someone out there is still determined to kill Rose, and they're holding all the cards.



Most special days: Easter, Christmas, Baptism of the Lord, Trinity Sunday, Christ the King Sunday, and Epiphany Sunday are white and Reformation is red to symbolize the Holy Spirit (that descended like flames in the upper room).




