



Baldwin Center

The Baldwin Center is so thankful for our supporters. With your help, we provide hope to over 2,000 individuals with our programs and services. We believe deeply in human dignity, and we strive to provide our services with compassion, respect and integrity. Here are a few stories from the previous year...

A gentleman came to our homeless breakfast, and our staff realized that he had not bathed in months and that he needed care and compassion. Our staff opened our Clothes Closet to provide him with clean clothes. He also showered in our facilities and ate a warm, healthy breakfast.

Our Harvest Table of donated surplus food works on the honor system: take for yourself only what you need. Regularly, there is an elderly gentleman who walks to our Center for these food donations. After speaking with him, it was clear that he doesn't come only for himself, but also for the young mom with two young children who live in the apartment next to him.

One evening as one of our clients slept in an abandoned home, someone stole her coat. The next morning when she came to help serve breakfast, our kitchen manger noticed that she wasn't dressed warm enough for the weather. When the client relayed what had happened that night, the staff opened the Clothes closet for her, where she was able

to find a coat and other cold-weather clothes.

Stories like these happen daily at the Baldwin Center in Pontiac.

Oxford/Orion FISH provides emergency aid in the form of food and agency referrals to individuals in Oxford, Lake Orion, Addison and Oakland Township. FISH is 100% staffed by local volunteers. People who have a need for groceries can call the office at (248)628-3933.

Oakland County is known as one of the wealthier areas in the state, but many people are surprised that there are families in need. The need does exist and because of generous neighbors, FISH also offers backpacks/school supplies and Christmas gifts (AngelFISH program) for the children of their clients.

While FISH works closely with other family-aid agencies to assist local neighbors, they are unique in that they are financially supported primarily by private contributions from residents, businesses, area churches and schools. Although Gleaners, OLHSA (Oakland Livingston Human Services Agency) and Forgotten Harvest give surplus food, most of the food is collected through local food drives conducted by groups such as the Postal workers, Orion Neighborhood Television (ONTV), Meijer Simply Give program, schools, businesses, churches, boy and girl scouts, and local civic and religious organizations.

Food is also purchased from local merchants using funds given from many individuals and groups who donate funds obtained by many creative ways such as scout groups who collect bottles, rummage sales, raffles held by women's and men's clubs and so forth. Some supporters make cash or gift card donations regularly.

Oxford/Orion FISH The Methodist Children's Food Pantry Home Society

There are 14,000 children in the child welfare system in the state of Michigan. Each year, MCHS works with hundreds of these foster children, specifically those who have suffered traumatic abuse and neglect. For 101 years, MCHS has provided a safe place for children to call home, a healing environment, education, life skills, and so much more. We wouldn't be able to do this without the support of our community of supporters.

UMC Michigan Conference

From Bishop Bard's Joyful Journey blog: "New Year, New Tasks"



Perhaps some of you are familiar with the beautiful words of Howard Thurman's, "The Work of Christmas:"

When the song of the angels is stilled,
When the star in the sky is gone,
When the kings and princes are home,
When the shepherds are back with their flock,
The work of Christmas begins:
To find the lost, To heal the broken, To feed the hungry,
To release the prisoner, To rebuild the nations,
To bring peace among people, To make music in the heart.

I have been thinking about Thurman's words particularly in light of the release of the "Protocols of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation," a proposal for the future of The United Methodist Church. I have said that I think this is a hopeful development even as I am saddened by the idea of separation. I need to be clear, that this is only a proposal and there is a long road ahead in the coming months for this proposal to become legislation which might then become an official United Methodist Church agreement approved by the delegates of General Conference. I am committed to meeting with our Michigan delegation to discuss this proposal and look forward to hearing their ideas and feedback. I am looking forward to wider conversations within our conference about this proposal.

If this proposal, or something like it, becomes an approved plan for the future of The United Methodist Church, it seems likely that the Michigan Conference would remain affiliated with the post-separation United Methodist Church, though a vote could be taken to determine otherwise. If the Michigan Conference remained part of the post-separation United Methodist Church, I know that there will be churches that will affiliate with another Methodist denomination formed pursuant to the protocol. I am committed to working with every congregation and pastor with grace and with all the wisdom God's Spirit might impart. Change is likely coming, and we will navigate that change best if we seek to be loving, grace-filled, compassionate, wise, courageous, and if we continue to do the work of the church, the work of Christmas.

On the other side of whatever changes are coming, and in the coming months of this new year and new decade, the work God has given the church in Jesus Christ and by the power of the Spirit is this work of finding the lost, healing the broken, feeding the hungry, setting free, rebuilding the nations, bringing peace, helping each unique person find the song God has put in their heart and helping them sing and dance to it.

It remains needed work. The world is still plagued by war. The world and the church are still enmeshed in racism. Inequality tears at the fabric of our society. We are not doing what needs to be done to care for the earth. Too many struggle with addiction. Relationships that are meant to be life-giving are frayed. People feel disconnected from God. In the church itself, we face challenging decisions about buildings and budgets and leadership, and the changes in the denomination will not magically solve such realities. After the next General Conference, the work of the church will only be beginning anew.

Such ministry work entails soul work, the inner work of having our lives shaped in the spirit of Jesus. One of the things that all us Methodists share is Wesley's emphasis on the Christian life as formation in love. I trust we all remain committed to this soul work.

Ministry work and soul work will be accompanied by grief work. In this new year, it is likely that The United Methodist Church will be changed significantly, and there will be grief with that. As we look to the future, how we do ministry in the Michigan Conference will continue to undergo change, and there will be grief with that. I am committed to walking together with you as you do the important work of grieving. It is not all the work we have to do, but it is part of the work we need to do.

I am with you on this hard journey which is also a joyful journey.

Love never dies" (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a, MSG).

Wednesday, March 11, 2020: Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine by Gail Honeymoon. Meet Eleanor Oliphant: she struggles with appropriate social skills and tends to say exactly what she's thinking. Nothing is missing in her carefully timetabled life of avoiding unnecessary human contact, where weekends are punctuated by frozen pizza, vodka, and phone chats with Mummy. But everything changes when Eleanor meets Raymond, the bumbling and deeply unhygienic IT guy from her office. When she and Raymond together save Sammy, an elderly gentleman who has fallen, the three rescue one another from the lives of isolation that they had been living. Ultimately, it is Raymond's big heart that will help Eleanor find the way to repair her own profoundly damaged one. If she does, she'll learn that she, too, is capable of finding friendship—and even love—after all.

10 Guidelines for Christian Living By Billy Graham

(paraphrased by Carolyn Lawrie)

The Bible teaches us that Christian life is one of constant growth. When you realized you were a Christian, you were born into God's family. 2 Peter 3:18: "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and forever! Amen.". The Bible says we are to grow. It implies steady development, constant learning and increased wisdom.

- 1. Read your Bible daily (start weekly if this is new to you)
- 2. Learn the personal connection with prayer
- 3. Rely on the Holy Spirit. In Romans 8 it says the Holy Spirit prays for us. That should comfort us. Ask yourself if you have the Holy Spirit in your daily life. Stand aside and let him guide you daily in choices and the decisions of your life.
- 4. Attend church regularly, Christians need one another. We need to gather together to worship God, Jesus Christ.
- 5. Be a witnessing Christian. Question: If you were on trial and accused of being a Christian would there be enough evidence to find YOU guilty? (Convict YOU?)
- 6. Let LOVE be the ruling principle of your life. Jesus said to those who followed him "by this shall all men know that you are my disciples,* if you have <u>love</u> for one another." (John 13:35) * The greatest demonstration of the fact that we are Christians is that we love one another.
- 7. Be an obedient Christian. Attempt to let Christ have first place in all the choices of your life.
- 8. Learn to meet temptation. Temptation is not the sin. Giving in to the temptation is the sin. Let the Holy Spirit fight your temptation for you.
- 9. Be a wholesome Christian. Our lives should be attractive to others and commend the Gospel.
- 10. Live above your own personal circumstances. Don't let them get you down. Learn to live graciously within them, remember the Lord is with you.
