

Finance/Stewardship Update

We all know that as Stewards of God's kingdom on Earth, we are responsible for managing our time, talents, treasures & witness in such a way as to be consistent with the Second Commandment, "Love your neighbor as you love yourself." As Christians in Oxford Michigan, what does that look like?

Well, in 2020, we worked hard to bring food and sustenance to 150-200 people each week through our Wednesday Free Meals program and we were able to supplement with gift cards to help families provide for a better Thanksgiving & Christmas. Reverend Del Pino and Michelle Wood distributed the cards which were well received and helped make a difference in these troubled Covid months! The Church will continue investing in Community Outreach and be involved in this worthy Mission throughout 2021 and with your support, it will happen!

Faced with Covid-19 problems and the inability to meet and gather in the Church for Christmas Eve services, the Council Leadership planned an outdoor Community Carol Singing event (led by Alex Wolf on the keyboard & Lisa (Prawdzik) Dalmia singing) and was enjoyed by the 75-85 people who attended. Not bad for the freezing weather on Christmas Eve! Thanks to our wonderful tech team for setting everything up. Further thanks are due to Fred Nelson and the tech team as well as members of the Worship team who participate and prepare the Sunday You Tube services which enables everyone to keep in touch with the Church and each other.

We want to thank those who have pledged during November's Stewardship month. It makes our budgeting and planning so much easier and more accurate when we have a good idea what to expect.

We have rented out the parsonage starting mid January 2021. This will bring in much needed money to help fund our Mission plans for 2021.

So on to this year. Much is changing, yet the needs of the Church and its Community stay the same and continue to grow. We have a constant and loving God who will continue to provide for us, and through us, provide to others. Free Meals will continue to be served (time and talent), gifts will be provided for special occasions (time and treasure), we plan to be more intentional in the community (time, treasure and talent) and in general to expand our community footprint. Wouldn't it be wonderful to see our church and facilities used to their fullest!

Do you enjoy reading? We do!!!

Our Book Group is always looking for more readers who like to chat with friends about books. We meet the **second Wednesday** of the month at **1:00pm** in the Memorial Room.

Wednesday, January 13, 2021: Tara Road by Maeve Binchy. The author shows her incomparable understanding of the human heart in the tale of two women, one from Ireland, one from America, who switch lives, and in doing so learn much about each other, as well as much about themselves. Ria lived on Tara Road in Dublin with her dashing husband, Danny, and their two children. She fully believed she was happily married, right up until the day Danny told her he was leaving her to be with his young, pregnant girlfriend. By a chance phone call, Ria meets Marilyn, a woman from New England unable to come to terms with her only son's death and now separated from her husband. The two women exchange houses for the summer with extraordinary consequences, each learning that the other has a deep secret that can never be revealed.

Wednesday, February 10, 2021: The Horse Dancer by Jojo Moyes. When Sarah's grandfather gives her a beautiful horse named Boo--hoping that one day she'll follow in his footsteps to join an elite French riding school, away from their gritty London neighborhood--she quietly trains in city's parks and alleys. But then her grandfather falls ill, and Sarah must juggle horsemanship with school and hospital visits.

Natasha, a young lawyer, is reeling after her failed marriage: her professional judgment is being questioned, her new boyfriend is a let-down, and she's forced to share her house with her charismatic ex-husband. Yet when the willful fourteen-year-old Sarah lands in her path, Natasha decides to take the girl under her wing. But Sarah is keeping a secret--a secret that will change the lives of everyone involved forever.

Wednesday, March 10, 2021: The Rent Collector by Camron Wright. Survival for Ki Lim and Sang Ly is a daily battle at Stung Meanchey, the largest municipal waste dump in all of Cambodia. They make their living scavenging recyclables from the trash. Life would be hard enough without the worry for their chronically ill child, Nisay, and the added expense of medicines that are not working. Just when things seem worst, Sang Ly learns a secret about the bad-tempered rent collector who comes demanding money--a secret that sets in motion a tide that will change the life of everyone it sweeps past. The Rent Collector is a story of hope, of one woman's journey to save her son and another woman's chance at redemption.



Epiphany

JANUARY 3 - FEBRUARY 14, 2021

For 40 days, between Christmas and Lent (right before the Baptism of Christ) is the season of Epiphany. The earliest recorded definition of Epiphany refers to the religious observance on January 6th: "A church festival in commemoration of the coming of the Magi as the first manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles or in the Eastern Church in commemoration of the baptism of Christ."

Epiphany and revelation have many similarities in meaning; one sense of epiphany is "a revealing scene or moment," and one sense of revelation is "something that is revealed." However, epiphany may also mean "an appearance or manifestation especially of a divine being," a sense not shared by revelation. Additionally, revelation is more likely to be used in the ecclesiastic

sense of "an act of revealing or communicating divine truth."

No matter how you make things new this Epiphany season, remember the joy and wonder of the birth of Christ and the awe of Jesus' baptism. Start every day remembering that like Jesus you also were baptized [If not please feel free to talk to Pastor Julius about this], and God spoke these blessing words to you also:

"_____ (your name), you are my son/daughter.
You are my beloved.
With you I am well pleased."

Matthew 3:17
